


Why invest in HSBC Global Sustainable Multi-Asset Portfolios?


Portfolio Performance


Diversification: Where does your money go?

Incorporating sustainability

Counterparty Risk: The possibility that the counterparty to a transaction may be unwilling or unable to meet its obligations.
